# COMMITTEE REPORTS- 2024

## EVALUATION AND PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Evaluation and Planning Committee diligently carried out its responsibilities this year, focusing on three critical areas: assessing the Executive Director's role, recommending updates to the job description, and reviewing the Association's bylaws for potential improvements. These efforts were undertaken with a commitment to ensuring the VNLA operates efficiently and remains aligned with its mission. The updated bylaws, which incorporate these recommendations, are now available for review on the VNLA website, demonstrating our dedication to transparency and accountability within the organization.

A major milestone for 2024 was the appointment of a new Executive Director, Jas Darland, marking the first leadership transition in decades. Jas began her role in January and has spent the year immersing herself in the multifaceted responsibilities of the position. This has been a significant adjustment for both Jas and the Association, but the process has been greatly supported by Kristina, who remained on hand to provide training and guidance throughout the year. Their regular work sessions have ensured continuity in leadership and allowed Jas to gain a solid understanding of the role's demands.

As we adapt to this transition, we recognize the need to manage the workload carried by the Executive Director. The board has been actively exploring solutions to provide additional support, including increased involvement from board members, seeking external assistance, and potentially hiring a bookkeeper to take on administrative tasks. These measures aim to strengthen the infrastructure of the VNLA and ensure that Jas can focus on strategic priorities.

Another notable aspect of 2024 was the stability within the board, with no member turnover for the first time in recent memory. This consistency provided much-needed steadiness during a year filled with other significant changes. However, 2025 will bring a new chapter, as three members—Ashley Robinson, Ray DeFeo, and Annie White—will be stepping down. Each of these individuals has made tremendous contributions to the Association, from spearheading volunteer projects to taking on committee roles and establishing impactful programs like the plastic pot recycling initiative. Their dedication has left a lasting legacy, and we hope you will take a moment to thank them for their service.

At the upcoming annual meeting on February 13, members will vote to welcome three new board members. While it is always bittersweet to see valued contributors leave, we are excited about the fresh perspectives and energy that new members will bring. With this new leadership and the ongoing efforts to enhance our organizational structure, 2025 promises to be an exciting and transformative year for the Vermont Nursery and Landscape Association.

## FLOWER SHOW COMMITTEE REPORT

With such a successful 2023 Vermont Flower show that included record attendance after a 4 year hiatus due to the pandemic, we are back to producing this VNLA signature event every two years. I believe the VNLA founders and early leaders would be so very proud to see what they began 60+ years ago has evolved into what it is today.

The Vermont Flower Show is a one-of-a-kind showcase event brought to the public on behalf of the VNLA and its members and there is no other show like it! This signature event and our VNLA members and associates represent true collaboration and speak to what an incredibly dedicated group of professionals, and in many cases competitors with one another, can accomplish. It's fun, it's inspiring, and it brings us all together!

Mark your calendar for **March 7-9, 2025!** The show theme, A Story of Gardening, will be a replication of different styles of gardening through history. There will be a field of tulips, an English Garden, and a Japanese Tea House Garden as well as Medieval, Islamic, and Victory Gardens. It will be a Grand Garden display not to be missed!

The two Flower show Committees, comprised of 35+ members, have been meeting/planning for the last 14+ months and they volunteer so much of their time, energy, labor, and resources to the implementation of the show. We could not produce this show without each of them. They give tirelessly, enthusiastically, and their dedication demonstrates how exceptional they are in every way.

We could also not produce this show without the continued support of sponsorship, in-kind donations, and the many volunteers that come forward for set-up, staffing the show, and clean-up. It is the best feeling ever when the doors open to the public and the magic of what has been created is displayed on their faces.

Vendors began signing up in August to exhibit in the Flower Show Marketplace and I am happy to report there are only a handful of booth spaces available. Tickets went on sale in early December and so far, we are ahead of sales compared to 2023. Other show highlights include 35+ seminars and workshops, many of which are being presented by VNLA members. There is a Family Room with kid-friendly crafts and scheduled entertainment and the Federated Garden Clubs of Vermont will present a judged competition. At the conclusion of the show, the much-anticipated plant sale will occur and is a great way for people to bring home some spring blooms and helps us begin the "clean-up" process.

**COME JOIN US** and consider volunteering to help with the myriad of tasks that include helping build the garden display, staffing the show as a cashier or in the VNLA booth, and helping with the clean-up process on Sunday evening, a time where there is no such thing as too many people helping!

We can't wait to open the doors to the public and let them know what the VNLA is all about and we look forward to reporting back on producing our best show yet!

## LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Over the past year, a key focus for our industry was House Bill H.706 – An act relating to banning the use of neonicotinoid pesticides. This legislation aimed to address environmental concerns and reduce risks to pollinators by restricting the use of these pesticides. While the Bill had significant implications for Vermont agriculture, its direct impact on Vermont horticulture remained limited. Nevertheless, one of our members took the initiative to engage with the legislative committee, ensuring our industry's voice was heard during discussions. We appreciate their efforts and encourage similar involvement from our membership in future legislative matters.

As the 2025 Vermont legislature reconvenes in Montpelier, we are not currently aware of any pending bills or initiatives that could directly affect our industry. However, the legislative landscape can change quickly, and it is essential for us to stay proactive. We urge members to monitor developments and share any relevant information that could impact our work or operations. Early awareness allows us to address concerns effectively and advocate for our collective interests.

## **THE PLASTIC POT RECYCLING PROGRAM**

This year's recycling program was a great success, thanks to key improvements that streamlined the process and increased efficiency. The standout enhancement was the use of plant delivery carts provided by Prides Nursery. These carts eliminated the need to construct recycling pallets, making the entire process smoother and more effective. The carts were easier to load onto trucks, more manageable for drivers, and faster to unload at Prides Nursery.

The amount of plastic recycled from Vermont has steadily increased over the past four years. While we don't have exact numbers specific to Vermont, we are proud to have contributed significantly to Prides Nursery's overall recycling efforts. In 2023, Prides recycled over 125 tons of plastic, and that number has grown to more than 130 tons this year. This positive trend underscores the growing impact of our recycling initiatives.

As a VNLA member, you can further promote this program by organizing a recycling event in your town. A great example of this is the collaboration between Monkton Friends Church and the VNLA, which hosts an annual nursery pot recycling and education day each May at their local recycling center. Events like this not only keep nursery containers out of the waste stream but also provide an opportunity to connect with members of your community and showcase the VNLA's commitment to sustainability.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

In 2024, we successfully budgeted and funded our programs, events, scholarships, marketing efforts, and administrative expenses. Thanks to the dedication and collaborative efforts of our members, board, and director, our balance sheet remains strong. This positions us well to fully fund our 2025 budget. A key highlight of the year was the fundraising auction at the summer meeting, which raised \$1,700 to support NOFA's fund for flooded farmers—an inspiring example of our community's generosity.

We also managed to absorb the additional costs associated with training our new executive director without disrupting our financial stability. To commemorate our 60th anniversary, we published a special hard copy edition of The Dirt, a milestone that celebrates our legacy

Membership contributions exceeded expectations in 2024, coming in slightly higher than budgeted. In light of rising expenses, we approved a modest increase in membership dues to ensure continued financial sustainability.

Our CDs generated approximately \$2,400 in interest, providing an additional boost to our financial health. I want to extend my deepest gratitude to our members for their hard work, commitment, and willingness to volunteer. A special thanks to the board for their thoughtful planning and budgeting, which have been instrumental in our success this year.

## VOLUNTEER PROJECT OUTREACH COMMITTEE (VPOC)

The committee worked hard over the year coordinating and connecting with communities around the state including Morristown, Burlington and Vergennes to help design landscape plans for future implementation. Such projects included a traffic circle in Morristown, gardens at the Bixby Library and a site plan for ***Green Mountain Habitat For Humanity***.

We designed & installed 1 VPOC project as a part of our ***VT Blooms Initiatives***. This event took place October 5th in Shoreham.

We have completed a design plan for ***Green Mountain Habitat For Humanity*** scheduled for installation fall 2025. VNLA member Holly Greenleaf drew a beautifully illustrated plan, worked with GMHFH project manager and the city to provide necessary information for permit approval. Thanks to Holly for her leadership on this project! We look forward to continued work with GMHFH in 2025!

### Project Recap:

For our Shoreham project the committee worked in collaboration with the town and residents to develop a site & planting plan for the town green. The area was primarily an open space between the Town Hall and the Platt Memorial Library. A newly built pavilion designated the center of the space with plantings to surround and soften, while allowing for easeful access to and from the buildings, pavilion and adjacent playing fields.

The installation was completed within a morning with help from committee members, VNLA and community volunteers. A huge THANK YOU to all who helped provide donations and the MANY hands at work!

We established the VT Blooms Initiative in 2020 to reach out to communities in need, collaborate with local municipalities and residents to help affect positive change. The goal is to help engage communities with their outdoor public spaces, connecting people with their environments.
